Dear beneficiaries of God's grace,
Recently, I have been involved in conversations about budgets at church and Circuit level and the finance for the Horizons Project. So lots of figures have been

flying around and I am thankful to those who devote much energy and time to administrating our financial affairs and who seek to help me to understand them. This prompts me to focus this letter upon thinking about our monetary giving, not from an accounting angle but from a theological perspective.

Our Methodist Membership tickets these days say that as members of the Methodist Church we are committed to 'using [our] resources to support the Church its mission in the world'. Our resources include our time, our abilities and our money. The Church's mission is a part of God's mission in the world, because God is also at work outside the boundaries of the Church.

Our monetary giving to the Church is part of our response to the goodness of God to us: to his free, undeserved, unearned grace: to the love that was shown when Jesus came to live among us to rescue us from the mess into which we had got ourselves; to the gift of the Holy Spirit who comforts and strengthens us. We cannot repay God for the generosity that has been shown to us because we have been treated benevolently in an extravagant way. What we give is a symbol of our gratitude and an expression of our love.

The Bible contains lots of examples and teaching which focus on wealth and giving, because giving is an important

Jewish and Christian practice. I have not space to dwell too much on these themes, but here are some selections. In the Old Testament, the people of Israel were instructed to offer a proportion of their harvest (the first fruits, which were also the best fruits) in thankfulness to their Creator. Later in the history of Israel, the people were directed to give a tenth of their wealth (a 'tithe') to God. Jesus commends the poor widow for giving everything she had to the Temple treasury. Zacchaeus gives his wealth to the poor and those he has cheated as a response to Jesus' unexpected, loving treatment of him. The Good Samaritan pays for the injured stranger's care at the inn and offers to come back to pay any additional costs. In the early church, followers of Jesus sold their possessions and distributed the proceeds according to people's needs. Paul writes of the

(2 Corinthians 9:15 – New Century Version.)

generosity of the Macedonians who gave as much as they could and more in response to a collection for the poor. He instructs his readers to 'give from what they have' (2 Corinthians 8:11-NCV) and asserts that 'God loves the person who gives happily' (2 Corinthians 9:7 - NCV).

Some of the giving mentioned above is not channelled through the Church or Temple but goes directly to others. Similarly, not all of our giving may be directed to the Church. We might decide to give some of our money to specific charities, which may be seen as other partners in God's mission to the world.

Talking about how much any individual should give to the Church is notoriously difficult. There is no easy formula to apply, though we might gain some principles from Scripture. Each person has to consider prayerfully how much she or he can and wants to give in response to God's generosity and to the needs around them. Some may decide to give a percentage of their gross income; some a percentage of their net income; some a percentage of what remains after the necessities of life have been paid for; some an amount based upon the Church's expenditure divided by the number of members; some an equivalent sum to what they spend on their own pleasure and entertainment. Whatever we give, the important thing is for us to recognise that our use of money (and our attitudes towards it) is a part of our life of discipleship; and God asks us to act responsibly with it and give as generously as we are able.

May God guide you in your giving and thank you for all that you contribute to Cheadle Hulme Methodist Church (both financially and otherwise),

On 12th July we will be celebrating the work of Action for Children, the children's charity of the Methodist Church, founded by a young Methodist Minister, Rev Thomas Bowman Stephenson in 1869. When he arrived in London he couldn't believe how

many homeless children there were. He set up The National Children's Home to reach out and support children across the UK. Today we are "Action for Children" and sadly help is needed just as much as it was 145 years ago.

In the U.K. one child in every ten is neglected, not fed, not washed, not clothed adequately, not schooled and not loved. One child dies every week at the hands of an adult they should have been able to trust for care..... **THIS IS NOT ACCEPTABLE....we have to help.** Let's take **ACTION** to keep children safe.

Action for Children Sunday envelopes will be in the pews for donations towards their work - our Methodist Charity - we in the North West support various projects throughout the area.

The Action for Children notice board gives information about these projects and the brilliant results. We can make a

CHELWOOD FOODBANK UPDATE 6

Foodbank Update

We have recently been visited by Booth's supermarkets who have just opened a new store in Hale Barns. They approached us as they wanted to support a local, independent food bank. They will support the foodbank by positioning a permanent collection bin in their store and will provide volunteer placements for some of our clients if required.

Our Edgeley foodbank – the '**Olive Branch**' has been open since the beginning of February. As well as running a foodbank every Wednesday morning, it also opens twice a week on Monday and Thursday afternoons as a 'drop-in' for people who need a chat, some advice or help with basic IT skills.

We have recently done food collections at the Co-Op in Edgeley and the Co-Op in Cheadle Hulme so we have been able to top-up our general food stocks. However, we are always running out of the usual specifics such as UHT milk, sugar, juices, biscuits, pasta sauces, tinned meats and tinned fish.

Loaves & Fishes

Our homeless project has now been extended so that we offer a hot meal every Saturday and Sunday evening at Stepping Stones in Stockport. We have seen a steady increase in numbers and now average between 35 – 45 clients every night. We believe that God has plans to develop the ministry by acquiring some sort of premises that could be used to accommodate homeless people and offer them a warm, safe Christian environment. To this end, we have been challenged by Isaiah ch 58 and have decided that we need to pray and fast regularly and trust that God will open the right doors for us. A group of our volunteers have decided to pray and fast every Tuesday for the vision for Loaves & Fishes and we would welcome others to join us if they feel so led. Many thanks for your generous support - we could not function without your help.

Homelessness in Stockport – exciting news!

On Friday 5th June I went to a meeting at Chelwood Baptist Church, invited because I deliver our donations once a month. I didn't know what it was about but I went anyway. It was most interesting.

The people involved with Chelwood Foodbank and the Loaves and Fishes project have been looking for better ways to help the homeless in Stockport than the “sticking plaster” aid they feel they are giving at present – valuable though that is.

Speakers at the meeting were Ed Levy, who is running (and started) Loaves and Fishes, Pete Cunningham from an organisation called Green Pastures and Darren Jones who runs the Lighthouse project in Rotherham.

Green Pastures are based in Southport and essentially lend money to organisations to buy and renovate properties to house the homeless. They started by doing this themselves in Southport and like many great schemes it has spread. (Link : www.greenpastures.net/invest)

Lighthouse in Rotherham are one of the schemes GP has helped – they now have a 16-bed Hostel for over-25s, a 13-bed Women's project, 3, 3 bed and 2,2 bed “moving on” homes plus a 6 -bed unit where senior clients are trained to become workers with the scheme. They provide counselling and care with set boundaries (which they find help the clients) and enable them to change through involvement with their social enterprises .Many of their clients have become Christians although there is no overt pressure to do so.

Chelwood are keen to take on this challenge and develop a scheme in Stockport. So – watch this space

COLLECTING FOR CHRISTIAN AID

I am sitting with feet up, a hot cuppa and a paracetamol for the bruised knuckles after knocking at lots of shut doors in Cheadle Hulme. *“Sorry to disturb you, but I am calling to collect the envelope (like this one). It’s for Christian Aid.”* There is a 30% chance they will immediately take you at your word and triumphantly wave the empty envelope back in your direction. Sometimes an excuse is offered, such as, “I’m alright” (not quite the point of the exercise); or, “The dog ate it” (this year I even had a baby who ate it!!); or, “I’ve not seen it” (because I had told the wife to bin it) ... Well, I can take it! And I thank them pleasantly and add, *“God bless you!”* (For, since we are knocking in the name of Christianity, I feel we may as well let them know that God is undoubtedly interested in them.) Some dear folk are a delight to meet ...having already filled the envelope, studied the gift-aid instructions, torn off the flap and filled it in and then placed it inside the envelope before sealing it. These folk tend to thank you for calling! *“I have been waiting for you to come!” ...I used to collect and I know what it’s like ...*” And if you have wrongly decided they were not in, such folk have even run after me bare-foot...(perhaps I had called at her bath-time?) It is impossible to arrive at every door at the most convenient time, although I do try to avoid siesta time at bungalows, bath-time at family homes, and mealtimes (but was once turned away from a home at 3.30 p.m.: *“We are eating!”*) It is brilliant when you call at precisely the RIGHT moment. I had almost turned away from the door to a family home when I realised that an elderly lady had arrived at the other side of it. She immediately said, *“Yes! I want to give you something!”* and then disappeared. On return, she had a £20 note in her hand, saying, *“It is 50 years ago today that my husband and I moved in here. We were so excited, and it has all been marvellous! He died at Christmas and I may not be here next year, but I just want to say thank you TODAY!”* And she gift-aided it, and regretted it was not more. I told her the story of the chicken farmer in Cambodia: *“He had been given £8 by Christian Aid (for the materials to build himself a hen-house, so that the animals from the forest could no longer eat his hens overnight). ‘What difference did that £8 make to him?’ He replied, ‘I know now that I shall be able to fund all of my 8 children to complete their education’.....So you can imagine what effective use will be made of your gift to Christian Aid.”* We felt we really had had a wonderful celebration of her anniversary. Another surprise was

to be greeted at a door by, “Didn’t I see you in church last night?” She remembered me from 32 years ago, at the school gates. I apparently haven’t changed much, but she has! – a contemporary of my daughter, and newly returned to Cheadle Hulme after many years out of the area. I’m hoping she will continue to rebuild her links with our fellowship. I reckon that half of the doors in Cheadle Hulme do not have a bell that works (hence the sore knuckles), and now that window blinds are the fashion, instead of curtains, it is much harder than it used to be for the occasional visitor to judge whether the residents are in or out: are they sitting in darkness to watch their favourite TV programme? Or is that light just one of the decoy ones to kid burglars that they are really in? Or maybe it is a moment of mourning, and they do not wish to be disturbed ... So their number goes on to the “Try to call again” list. Some, of course, just do not reply as the easiest way of telling me they do not wish to contribute. It is OK. It is all voluntary. And some, I really do believe, have already donated on-line. Just occasionally I wonder if I have stirred up family discord by my appearance: voices off...”You said you didn’t believe in it!” Mumbled denial. “Well, then, tell her it’s for Atheist Aid”..... (that also provided a gift-aided £20.) One poor hubby was asked, “Did you post that pile of letters this morning?” (arms akimbo). ”So WHERE is the red envelope? I put a lot of money in there!” I was assured later by phone that he had obediently retraced his steps, awaited the postman, and got him to promise to forward it to Christian Aid when he had searched through for it back at the sorting office. My only word of caution is, “Do not assume that a lovely Christian symbol will guarantee you a friendly reception.” This year I spotted a beautiful Celtic cross for someone’s new door knocker, so I was ready to pass comment on the beauty of the abbey at Iona, when the door was opened a little, but then immediately slammed loudly in my face. The other surprise came a few years ago, when I read the text in the door-window: “As for me and my house, we shall serve the LORD”. The door opened to reveal an authoritarian-looking chap with an up-ended broom in his hand, and he immediately advanced, waving it in my direction. Fortunately, I was a little more agile than him, so reached the safety of the pavement before him. It really is lots of fun collecting. Why not have a go next year? Margaret Clarke

Where are we going this year?



That's the usual question in the Brackenbury household in the spring. And having done 'the usual suspects' of long distance walking trails, we decided to create our own routes. Allan devised the 196 mile Northern Crossway which he last walked in 2011. It goes north-eastwards from the west coast at Arnside to the east coast at Bamburgh. It is a walk through the fine scenery of Cumbria and Northumberland, spending two days each crossing the Howgill Fells and the Cheviot Hills as well as passing through charming villages and the towns of Appleby and Hexham.

Meanwhile, Linda as her retirement project set about planning her own long distance trek from Land's End to John O'Groats. It takes an inland route through south-west England, then follows the Welsh border (but on the English side). Continuing northwards it crosses the Bowland and Howgill Fells and then crosses the Eden Valley to skirt the foothills of the Pennines. Having crossed into Nicola Sturgeon land, it uses surviving hill tracks, old drovers routes and military tracks (built by the English in response to Jacobite uprisings) to move northwards up the centre of Scotland before turning north-east, near Lairg, to head towards John O' Groats. Linda undertook this continuous 71-stage walk in 2012 and it pans out at 1035 miles, which is shorter than the more usual 1200 miles from routes heavily reliant on the national trails..

With both walks, the idea was to create inspirational walkers' routes that were fairly easy to navigate and which most reasonably fit walkers' could feel confident in undertaking. Furthermore, as the idea of back packing holds no appeal whatsoever, catered accommodation at the end of each day was a requirement. We have just published guides to both routes for those eager to follow in our footsteps (and those who would like to read about the experience). The *Brackwalks* web site has more details of the publications and a sample stage from Linda's book. (www.brackwalks.co.uk)


We feel very blessed in being able to do these walks and consequently hope in return to benefit local charities with profits from the guides. For organisations with whom we have close
