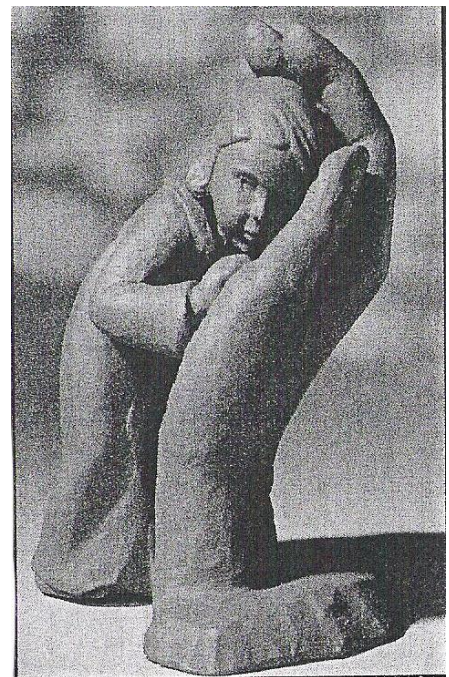

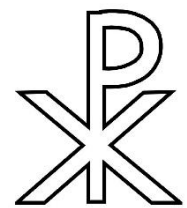

## Christ, the Victor

Think of a Roman mosaic. In it picture the head and shoulders of a young, fair-haired, clean-shaven man, wearing a tunic and robe. Behind the man's head see two superimposed Greek letters, a capital rho (P) and a capital chi (X), such that they are partly hidden behind it. On both sides of the head, imagine a pomegranate.

The above description is a fairly limited one – intended to sketch out the main features of part of a mosaic found in the remains of a Roman villa in Dorset, from about AD 350. If I asked you who this is meant to depict, then perhaps you might be fairly confident in replying Christ because of the Greek letters which are the first two of the Greek word for Christ (Christos). This mosaic probably contains one of the oldest surviving depictions of him, arising after Emperor Constantine's conversion to Christianity and Christianity being officially recognised alongside other religious and mythological beliefs. Christ appears looking a bit like a Roman Emperor or a god, with rich clothes and a hairstyle related to the fashion of the mid-fourth century.



Christ's head is a part of a larger mosaic which includes mythological elements. These include the Greek hero Bellerophon riding Pegasus and slaying the Chimaera, a monster combining the head of a lion, the body of a goat and a serpent's tail. It could be that people who saw the mosaic would make a link between Christ and Bellerophon, seeing the part depicting Christ as some sort of symbol for Christ's victory over death and evil.

The strife is o'er, the battle done; Now is the Victor's triumph won; O let the song of praise be sung: Allelulia! <i>(Hymns and Psalms, 214)</i>
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Further interpretation of the face of Christ in the mosaic can be done by considering the presence of the pomegranates on either side of it. These could be reminders of the myth of Persephone who was carried off to the Underworld, rescued by her mother and

brought back to land of the living. While in the Underworld, Persephone had eaten seeds from a pomegranate to sustain her in her time of darkness. Also, in the ancient world, pomegranates were commonly used as figurative images of eternal life. Therefore, the Dorset Christ can be seen to express the Christian hope alongside the hopes of others – that death is not the end but part of a bigger story which will reach its climax in the defeat of evil and in fruitfulness and abundant life.

In Britain, in the third and fourth centuries, Christ was merely one god amongst many others, so the appearance of Christ alongside images of other gods is not as incongruous as it might initially appear. What Christianity did was to adapt for its own purposes powerful imagery from Greek and Roman mythology to convey the message of resurrection and the triumph of life over death. Hence, the mosaic in Dorset, with parallels to be drawn between Christ and Bellerophon and Persephone.

This Easter we celebrate our risen Christ who, through his work on the cross, has defeated the powers of evil and triumphed over death. He is Christ, the Victor.

May you know something of the power which raised Christ from death working in your own life,

## **Church Council Jottings – February 2018**

18 members present and 9 apologies, the meeting was chaired by Rev Philip Peacock.

- Resources Team reported that there are ongoing issues with daytime usage of the car park.
- Property return is required by May 2018, to be completed by the Office Administrators and approved by the resources team.
- Quinquennial inspection reported that roof repairs are required.
- The Annual Accounts for year ended August 2017 were presented; signed by the Chair subject to approval by the Independent Examiner.
- New volunteers would be welcome for the Publicity Task Group.
- New regulations for Data Protection regulation come into effect in May 2018 which must be adopted by CHMC. Awaiting guidelines to be published by The Methodist Church.

## **Christian Aid Sponsor Walk- Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> May 2018**

This year is our 51<sup>st</sup> Sponsored Walk in aid of Christian Aid. There will be the choice of three routes to cater for all ages and walking abilities, all starting and finishing at St Martin's Church, Shrigley Road North, Higher Poynton, SK12 1TE. The three and six mile walks along the Macclesfield canal in the direction of Marple and back to St Martin's along the Middlewood Way, are flat and also suitable for buggies and scooters. The 8 mile route is a circuit around beautiful parts of Lyme Park, passing the Cage, Lantern and Paddock Cottage, through woods and meadows. All the routes are well signposted, there are marshals to guide you and we give all walkers a map. Well behaved dogs are very welcome.

Walkers register at St Martin's Church between 10 and 11 am on the day. Sponsor forms will be available for those planning to ask for sponsorship or alternatively we ask walkers to make a donation on the day to Christian Aid. Further information about the walk, the three routes and sponsorship forms will be on the Christian Aid notice board at church.

To ensure the walk runs smoothly we need a considerable number of helpers on the day, people to put up and take down the route signs, act as marshals, help with registration and making refreshments. Please could you offer to help for a couple of hours? Last year we had 85 walkers taking part and over £4700 was pledged in sponsorship on the day. Our target this year is 100 walkers and to raise over £5000.

Please could you note the date of the walk this year, **Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> May**, and consider what you could do, walking, helping with the walk on the day or sponsoring a walker?

# CHRISTIAN AID – WARMEST THANK YOU!

## GROWING ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES in Ghana

Our local Christian Aid group would like to thank all our supporters for enabling us to complete our second Special Project in Africa, where we sent in £5,000, and the European Union tripled it, to make a total of £15,000 – staggering! THANK you all!

The first Special Project was focused on the Democratic Republic of Congo where some of the poorest people on earth live. We helped them develop a ‘voice’ to help them explain their needs to local government, with the result that now they have safe drinking water locally, some simple medical services and a belief that their needs CAN be attended to!

Our Second Project is focusing on the need for job creation in Ghana, where unemployment currently stands at 48%. The issue is most acute for young adults who leave education but find no jobs available, particularly if they are young and disabled.

As a project is beginning, a meeting is called to *listen* to the ideas, hopes and dreams of relevant people. Local government is involved in this meeting.

**Needs assessment** is the next stage.

What skills are needed? driving? tailoring? welding? soap- or shoe-making, etc, ?

EMPOWERMENT comes next..... as people with the relevant skills are brought in and train young adults, as small loans are made available so that SET UP COSTS are covered and, as land is acquired, so that those longing to farm can begin to do so, CONTINUING GROWTH.

Those who have been trained later train new people their skills.

This explanation about these projects was given to us at our recent Lent Lunch, by Aba Hagan, from Ghana. Her employment is as the acting Senior Private Sector Engagement Officer for Christian Aid in Accra. I understand that the private sector is generally more effective in setting up and developing new businesses, so their partnership is beneficial in several ways to the people being trained in our projects.

Aba says that after the three years of Christian Aid's support (when they usually withdraw from these new and sustainable businesses, to start similar work elsewhere) she expects that **half a million young people will have become self-supporting because of this programme!**
